



Elbert J. Henry Jr

September 19, 1942 - November 28, 2020

Elbert James Henry, 78, of Birmingham, Alabama, passed away in Conyers, Georgia, on November 28, 2020. He grew up on Honeysuckle Hill, was a product of the Birmingham Public School System, and received salvation through his Lord, Jesus Christ, at an early age. Elbert had a decades-long federal career that began with the Social Security Administration in Birmingham and continued with his becoming an air traffic controller with the Federal Aviation Administration in Atlanta, Georgia. This led to a position at the Washington DC headquarters office where he traveled the world as the U.S. Government's representative on planning the future of satellite communication systems. Elbert was also an attorney and, after federal retirement, maintained an active law license as a member of the Georgia State Bar. Elbert was known for his generosity of spirit, often extending a hand with a willingness to give "his last" if it would help someone out of a difficult situation. Though he was quite passionate about his professional pursuits, his deep love for his family, friends, Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity brothers, and church family was evident in the way he lived. Elbert was a devoted member of Sixth Avenue Baptist Church and especially looked forward to meeting with his Sunday School class each week.

Elbert was preceded in death by his father Elbert J. Henry, Sr., mother Gladys Bonner, stepfather David Bonner Sr., and son, Imara Henry. He is survived by his daughter, Liana Henry; brothers David Bonner and Alfred Bonner; sisters

Anne Louise Hanna, Davetta White, Alfreda Bonner, and Nikki B. Lawrence, along with many nieces, nephews, great nieces, great nephews, cousins and friends.

A memorial celebration will be held via Zoom on Tuesday, December 8, 2020, at noon EST.

“ My deepest sympathy to Elbert's family. We've never met but I knew Elbert well when we worked together, many years ago.

I first met Elbert in the late 1980's, when we were both working on the Automatic Dependent Surveillance System for FAA.

The first thing that struck me about him was, of course, the quiet person he was. The second thing I noticed was that he was always paying attention. He spoke when needed, but was always thinking. Although he didn't talk a lot, when he spoke, it was worth listening to. He liked a good laugh too, and we had plenty of those. But he was always focused precisely on his purpose, representing FAA and the United States. They couldn't have asked for a better person to do it.

We spent a lot of time at meetings in different places, including lots of time in Montreal, and of course the DC area. I don't remember any of the meetings, but I have great memories of some of the places. I remember the Montreal Jazz Festival, and walking on the beaches of New Caledonia - and Sydney, Australia, where we walked with him through half the town with only one mission: to buy a Hard Rock Café t-shirt!

I learned how to pick out ties from him. Not that he would know it, but he inspired me to that, just by me seeing the professional way in which he presented himself every day. He always wore a jacket with a nice tie, and now I do, too. Thank you, Elbert.

Later on, we shared a bond of sadness that no father wants ever to experience. He was devastated, and I wish I could have found some better words to help. But sometimes, there are none. All that helps is to have friends who stand by you. What followed were very difficult times, and I was very afraid for him. But he did find a way to recover, for which I was very thankful. He moved back home, and I didn't get to see him anymore. Still, at Christmas time, he would send me a little message, and we always had that bond. The words

weren't so important, but it was more his way of simply saying, "I remember."

I will miss him. I will always remember him as a person who wanted to do good for others. I never heard him speak harshly, say anything mean, or speak without thinking first. He was a true gentleman. A gentle man. Quiet, considerate and thoughtful.

A good man, and a good friend. I remember.

“ Dearest Elbert. You found CAVU - Fly high good buddy!

I extend my deepest sympathy and condolences to Elbert's family. He dearly loved his daughter Liana and always shared how very much she was doing for him when we spoke during this last 18-month journey. He was so proud of all she has accomplished and dearly appreciated all that she was doing for him. And he often spoke of his siblings, his brothers, and his loving sisters. He loved you all so very much.

I met Elbert over 30 years ago where he was working as the D.C. Air Traffic Controller representative on a major research and development project, entitled Automatic Dependent Surveillance (ADS). It was a program to develop a surveillance technique for aircraft to automatically provide, via a data link, data derived from on-board navigation and position-fixing systems, including aircraft identification, four-dimensional position, and additional data as appropriate. We worked together for more than a decade to develop the standards and recommended practices for this critical capability. Elbert represented the US FAA at International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) – a specialized agency of the United Nations. It changes the principles and techniques of international air navigation and fosters the planning and development of international air transport to ensure safe and orderly growth. We spent many years in Montreal developing the ADS SARP – Standards and Recommended Practices. That is where I learned that when Elbert spoke, I needed to listen. He did not say much but when he did, it was because it was important!

This program led to many others and a great deal of work supporting modernizing oceanic air traffic control. This took us to many exotic locations around the globe, including Alaska among other international destinations. The tragedy of one fateful trip to Alaska remains one of the saddest times of Elbert's life. The entire aviation community mourned with Elbert and watched and wondered what we could do to reduce his suffering. It was a dark

time for the family and Elbert lost his way for a while. Frank Lorge, Bob Kaminsky, and other colleagues worked hard to support him during those difficult years. Thank God, he found his way through that dark time.

I had my dark hours as well and lost my job. Elbert to the rescue! He hired me to support him at the FAA Headquarters. We continued to travel the globe to coordinate with many other countries and agencies around the world managing oceanic aviation air traffic control. We also worked on the data link message structure for the air traffic controllers, a program entitled Controller Pilot Data Link Communications (CPDLC). CPDLC is a two-way data-link system by which controllers can transmit non urgent 'strategic messages to an aircraft as an alternative to voice communications. This was critical to develop the automated systems on the ground to support more efficient and effective air traffic control. One of my fondest memories from that program was being in Japan with Elbert and Bruce Eckstein – two very tall gentlemen. Bruce wore a tall cowboy hat and cowboy boots, and Elbert was always impeccably dressed. We, three, were walking down a street in Kobe, Japan, when two Japanese came up to us and asked to take our picture – apparently the only English they knew was “Mod Squad”! They both towered over my small 5-foot, 3-inch structure, but I had the best laugh when we had to take off our shoes and sit for eating Kobe steak– they really struggled with that!

There are so many more stories and wonderful memories of this incredibly cool cat, gentle giant, and fine gentleman. Elbert I am playing your favorite Sam Cooke among your other favorite heartfelt jazz musicians, thinking of you...

To know "Elb" was to love "Elb!". Even as a boy, growing-up on Honeysuckle Hill, he commanded the highest respect from both young and old--but his voice was never louder than a gentle echo. "Elb" possessed a depth of wisdom that stretched far beyond his years and peers. While Elb was a man whom everyone recognized as an intellectual giant; still, God blessed him with a unique sense of kindness and compassion that caused even the youngest infant to feel totally safe and protected in his presence. I was only about 5 or 6 years old when his twin siblings Alfreda and Alfred were born. During those hot summers when Elb's boyhood peers (which included my older brothers James, Earl Jr., and Lester) would often stop at his house and beg him to come join us to play baseball--Elb (who was a great pitcher) had to refuse their invitation because he was responsible for taking caring of his younger sisters and brothers.
